supporters filed in a caravan of 25 SUVs to travel up the mountaintop of Nan Michel and Delice, Haiti. and attended the dedication ceremony for the Bishop Sarah Frances Davis outpatient health clinic on October 30th, 2017. The three-star clinic is now open, complete with an operative water tower and solar panels, accepting patients and offering quality healthcare to the local residents.

On November 14, 2016, 16 months after the resounding commitments, surrounded by a cloud of witnesses, Dr. Shirley Cason-Reed broke ground in Quest Department, Delice, Haiti for a WMS-sponsored women's medical center. Did she imagine the response to her vision would have gotten this type of response? "Never!" said Dr. Reed. "But it just goes to show when God gives you a vision and you act on the vision, He sees it through."

### Missionaries Initiating Transitional Efforts (M.I.T.E.) disaster relief/emergency preparedness

Our Zion continues to exercise collaborative efforts through monetary donations, Hands-On rescue relief initiatives, distributions and support. M.I.T.E. remains committed to its present proactive mission design and further seeks to explore applications for long-term recovery planning, to secure more expedient transitions from "disaster to deliverance".

### o Relief for Hurricane Harvey in Texas

Soon after the assessment of damages caused by Hurricane Harvey, President Reed traveled to Texas, sleeves rolled up, ready to work. Joining forces with Bishop Vashti McKenzie, Supervisor Stan McKenzie and First Vice President Deborah Taylor King. President Reed came and witnessed the devastation of Hurricane Harvey in Texas. Medical professionals and other Texas leaders joined us as we encouraged people, volunteered at shelters, provided supplies and financial assistance to those severely impacted by the storm. Our missionary "boots-on-the-ground" project assisted in providing relief and much needed assistance for over 600 people. The WMS distributed cash, gift cards, blankets, and over 500 pairs of new shoes to those affected by the damages.













#### o Relief for Irma in Florida

Immediately after we provided relief for Hurricane Harvey, Hurricane Irma left a catastrophic impression in Florida. With millions left without power and historic levels of flooding, President Reed and the WMS provided funds for the 11th Episcopal District under the leadership of Bishop A.J. Richardson and Supervisor Connie S. Richardson to assist relief efforts for members of that district.

was provided to retired Bishop Frederick Talbot and Supervisor Dr. Sylvia Talbot from the Virgin Islands

to Nashville, Tennessee, after extreme weather-related devastation.

### WMS Foundation, Inc. & Foundation Walk

The WMS Foundation, Inc. continues to raise funds to support global missions in Episcopal Districts 14-20 and AME India (4). In 2019, WMS Foundation (WMSF) paid \$600 per month stipend to each of districts 14-20 and AME India (4)in support of their mission initiatives. These distributions were made possible by membership dues and donations received from WMS members and other donors.

To raise funds to support the continuation of the monthly stipends, the WMSF Board sponsored **MissionWalk2020** at the site of the WMS Executive Board meeting in Houston, Texas, January 29 – February 1, 2020. MissionWalk2020 was a 3K walk-a-thon held at Tom Wussow Park just four blocks from the Hilton Hotel North, headquarters for the Executive Board Meeting. The event was held at 6:00 am on Friday, January 31, 2020. Each WMS Conference Branch President was asked to register a team of 15 participants with each person raising a minimum of \$100 each. Every person who met the minimum fundraising goal was eligible to receive the MissionWalk kit that included a custom windbreaker, beanie, and flashlight.

34 teams were registered and 200+ excited and energized persons participated in the walk-a-thon. The total funds raised was \$72,095—just \$27,905 short of the \$100,000 goal. After the walk-a-thon, the MissionWalk Planning Team announced and distributed awards of certificates, medals and trophies to the top team, individual and district fundraisers. Bags of healthy snacks of bananas, halo oranges, granola bars, Gatorade and bottled water were also provided for participants.

It is indeed an honor and a privilege to present my second report as the Connectional Director of the Young People's and Children's Division of the Women's Missionary Society of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Over the last four years, I have been tremendously blessed to provide guidance, counsel and love to an amazing group of young people who are so incredibly gifted, anointed and are committed to the cause of Christ and African Methodism. The opportunity to join our Executive Board and Episcopal District Directors in building upon a legacy of service and innovation has been a pleasure and proven critical to the growth and development of this new age.

### **On-going Projects During this Quadrennial**

- **Self-Denial** continues to be one of our signature activities. The second vice president is assigned the task of creating a study guide for this program and we have not been disappointed. We are appreciative of Dzestinee Q. Glenn Bland (2016-2018) and Jordan Deveaux (2019-2020) for relevant themes and engaging lessons and activities.
  - Self-Denial Themes: 2016: iServe, 2017: iGive, 2018: iPraise, 2019: Just Breathe, 2020: "Listen Up"
- The Souper Bowl of Caring has raised \$123,853 over the past four years. We sent 4500 pounds of food and 345 kits and personal items. Through this mission project, our young people made a positive difference in the world as they served at hunger-relief centers, collected food and raised money for local food pantries (all of which remained in their local communities). This was a wonderful opportunity to show caring and compassion across the country.
- The annual Leadership Training Institute continues to be an inspirational learning event for our
  youth. The LTI themes were designed by the Executive Board with their peers in mind and have been
  reflective of their issues and interests.

**Director's Retreats:** In an effort to be intentional in our goal to build strong young people and effective YPD groups, an annual Director's Retreat is held to foster learning and training opportunities. After attending workshops, sharing pertinent information and best practices, the directors return home refreshed and inspired.

#### **Looking Ahead**

The projected Goals and Objectives for the next Quadrennial have been designed to move our organization forward in this ever-changing world. It is my belief that when we immerse our young people with opportunities to become involved in relevant mission work, their tasks become learning experiences.

### GOAL #1: Increase annual participation in the Self Denial Program by 20% across the Connectional Church.

Self-Denial was established as a fund-raising effort to provide scholarships for students. Participants can now showcase their video productions, editing, and computer skills. This is also a venue by which the young people can showcase their artistic, musical, oratorical and writing skills. We will research ways in which to increase participation, including making the Self-Denial booklet available electronically to our International family of YPDers.

GOAL #2: Create new partnerships with faith, civic, and non-profit organizations beyond the AME Church.

These partnerships will enrich programs and opportunities for our young people, while enhancing our organization's image and visibility.

GOAL #3: Continue to work with component organizations to ensure that our young people remain active and involved in the work and mission of our church upon graduation from the YPD.

It has been a challenge to keep our young people involved in the church once they have graduated/aged out of the YPD. Partnerships need to be forged throughout the Episcopal Districts well in advance of the separation dates so that the young people can develop a rapport with the members of the receiving organizations. This will enable them to experience a seamless transition. It is hoped that the District Directors will encourage the Conference Directors to provide information to the YPDers regarding these organizations.

In February of 2018, I traveled to the 15th and 19th Episcopal Districts. While in Cape Town, I attended the re-opening of the Balm of Gilead Centre, a comprehensive center which provides services for women and children, some of which include a day care and medical facilities. While there, we made a contribution to help ensure the continued success of this project.

Finally, I want to thank the Connectional church for your prayers, your constant encouragement and your support of the Young People's and Children's Division. I am also grateful for the commitment and time rendered to our young people by directors on all levels. As we continue to move forward, I am confident that the future church will be in capable hands. We remain committed to evangelize, teach, advise,

challenge and love our youth with the ultimate purpose leaders and remain committed to African Methodism.

WMS-AME NGO was selected by UN Women to make Oral Statement at CSW 63 10th Plenary Session, 2019 on the formation of the Caucus of Women and Girls of African Descent. Commission on the Status of Women: Participated, planned and implemented the Ecumenical Women's Worship themes and scriptures for weekly morning Prayer Service, at the UN Church Center Chapel in New York City, New York.

We have collaborated with CSA commissioner, Bertha Pitts, to spearhead a Mother's Day campaign to end Fistula. This "Love-a-Sister" initiative was designed to raise awareness and funds to aid those affected by Fistula. We have developed and provided informational handouts, DVDs, Fistula displays, brochures, and personal testimonies hoping to stress the importance of giving. 
